TONY WAITE ORGANISATION 2015 ANNUAL REPORT

INTRODUCTION

Tony Waite has had a successful year though some challenges have been faced. The organisation managed to scale up women's health, new born and child health to fishing camps which are hard to reach areas due to the large waters of Lake Kariba which separates community from service providers. These integrated sexual reproductive health services have seen many benefiting and as we focus on 90 90 90 targets many now are aware of their HIV status. More funding has been secured compared to the past year and of note is the scaling up of the kapenta project which came in with capital equipment like fishing rigs, and putting up a kapenta processing factory which has already benefited vulnerable groups through employment. A lot of activities and achievements were noted with a few challenges. The Organisation greatly appreciates the support given by its partners and stakeholders during planning, implementation and evaluation of projects. Tony Waite continues to mobilize resources through proposal writing donor visits and partnering with others. The following are partners that worked with the organisation in 2015:

- To strengthen coordination and networking


PROGRESS ON RESULTS

WOMEN'S HEALTH

The organisation scaled up its implementation on SRHR programme to 7 wards of Kariba urban as compared to two in the previous year as had been recommended during a stakeholder review meeting. The recommendation to go to Kariba rural and the fishing camps was also heeded with two fishing camps now receiving integrated SRHR health services courtesy of


Tony Waite Organization and Kariba District Hospital through SAT partnership. A gender transformative mapping approach was also conducted which sought to address problems at root level. It is hailed for its full involvement of key stakeholders at all levels as well as the community at large. It was evident that ward meetings were mostly being attended by adult females than males there by need to cover workplaces and youth in and out of school.

At a glance the table below shows 2015 PMTCT achievements and male involvement in ANC compared to 2014



A total of four trainings were conducted with 144 (12M 133F) people on GBV and ARSH, SRHR, PMTCT, Palliative Care and ISAL were offered to different target groups which consists of volunteers, youth in and out of school, church leaders and community leaders. This was to equip them in issues to do with SRHR as well as impart income generating skills in youths for self sustenance as they become adults. Leaders are also instrumental in fighting the harmful cultural practices that affect women in our community as revealed by the gender transformative mapping conduct hence training them and giving them leeway to also participate provides groundwork for success.

The SRHR projects managed to reach a total of 18 893(8793M 10 100F) with information and counseling while 1326 (641M 585F) got tested for HIV as a result. Tony Waite as an organisation is in different committees like gender committee, ant sexual violence committee and the health


centre committees. The organisation participated in the national campaign on HIV testing and counseling as well as the national measles rubella vaccination programme.

Total OVC reached per category see graph below.




Livelihood projects

Beneficiaries received 2 trainings during the year namely mushroom production with support from Agritex and compost making with support from Kariba Municipality. A total of 71(19M 52F) benefitted from these trainings. The trainings were as per request from the garden members in a bid to diversify as well as to produce mushroom which they have no challenges in marketing and may fetch them more money. Members of the 3 community gardens continue to work and yield profits from the nutritious gardens.

Tony Waite managed to continue with the buying and selling dried kapenta project. All targets for the project were met with groups of women and youths benefiting from seed money and employment as kapenta packers. As the project managed to sail through the second stage more community members are benefiting through employment. With the continuation of the kapenta buying and selling project the kapenta business community has also benefited from the organization through buying their kapenta products for packanging to the market. The up scaling of the kapenta project has injected capital goods like fishing rigs and putting up of kapenta proccessing factory which will improve the smooth running of the project. The partner came for a grant ceremony which was attended by most stakeholders who applauded the partnering and business community was urged to continue supporting the organization as number of needy people continues to rise. The organization managed to procure 2 rig permits

inorder to start fishing and adhere to requirements by government departments and parks and wildlife.

The organisation continued to distribute fish heads, kapenta, breams, tiger and to orphans, elderly and adults in need of nutrition and those living with HIV. It also received a shot in the arm and wishes to acknowledge the marathon run for the mealie meal and kapenta donation which helped families a lot during the last quarter of the year. The organisation has also managed to provide emergency food packs to either women of domestic violence and for clients on home based care. The food distribution reached a total of 1441 (720M 721F) See photos below



The number of children who benefitted from scholastic support increased during the year with 5 (4M 1F) in university, 29 (9M 20F) primary and secondary students making a total of 34 (13M 21F). Youth clubs and support groups continued to meet once monthly during the course of the year reaching 242 (145M 97F).

As the organisation partnered with Antonio and Associates, a total of 6 females were legally helped, the cases ranged from sexual abuse, inheritance and domestic violence.

RESOURCE MOBILISATION

As mentioned before there were a number of partners during the course of the year. The organisation managed to mobilise resources for Christmas party through individuals, church, crispy fresh and mayor's cheer fund. STAFFING

More kapenta packers and merchandisers were recruited including fishermen and direct employment has benefited 55 with a breakdown of 27M 28F as the organization focuses on gender equality and up lifting the lives of women and youth. Out of the total benefiting, 27 (20M 7F) were youths with 21F adults with challenges ranging from domestic violence, lack of fees payment for school children and those furthering their studies.
