INTRODUCTION

Tony Waite organisation is operating in 9 wards (1, 2,3,4,5,6, 8,9, and 12) in Kariba District in both urban and peri urban areas it also covers the hard to reach areas like the fishing camps where people are separated from service providers by volumes of water in Lake Kariba. The organisation thrives to offer a robust and holistic package of services to the community with much emphasis on women and girls, boys and men health where integrated health services like PMTCT, TB, are covered. Tony Waite through palliative care for adolescents offers Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights and life skills to the adolescents to help them make informed decisions. The organisation through the livelihoods and kapenta projects thrives to enhance household income as well as raising nutrition levels of the community.

PROJECT TARGET

The organisation envisions a holistic and robust service to the community whereby men and women, boys and girls have equal access to services despite cultural norms and values. Tony Waite Organisation through the Gender Transformative Approach ensures that different gender groups have equal access to productive resources and it seeks to address norms and values which have placed women and girls at socio-economic disadvantage and prone to contract the HIV pandemic therefore the program seeks to address these detrimental practices to bring different gender groups on equal footing.

NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT

The organization has continued to create strong synergies and networking with local stakeholders and donors with the bid to offer nutritional support to the needy in the community. During the quarter it reached 376 (195M 181F) orphans and vulnerable children with the feed programme. A total of 233 (113M 120F) benefitted from fish heads whilst 77 (46M 31F) OVC and 16 (6M 10F) elderly benefitted from kapenta and rice. See photos below.



MEDICAL SUPPORT

A total of 7 508 (2 933M 4 575F) were reached with SRHR information which led to a total of 1 170(365M 805F) getting tested for HIV and knowing their statuses. The figure comprises those reached through in school peer education, woman's health, new born and child health project and those reached in youth clubs as well as through community mobilizations by the volunteers. Secondary caregivers continue to spread the gospel through ward meetings which resulted in 593 (159M 434F) being reached with PMTCT information whilst door to door counseling sessions reached 292 couples

and 532 (153M 379F) individuals with information. Volunteers have managed to reach 957 (242M 715) whilst they offered assistance to 186 (30M 156F) individuals on GBV and referrals were made to other service providers mainly the victim friendly unit where 10 referrals were made, 27 to social welfare whilst the rest chose to be assisted with counseling. Tony Waite volunteers have also managed to give TB adherence support to 39 (12M 27F) individuals. Youth in school peer educators reached 1 472 (662M 810F) with SRHR education and counseling. The PMTCT mothers' meetings are ongoing at Nyamhunga Clinic with the PMTCT champion spearheading the discussions and sharing testimonies where she reached 126 pregnant women. Nyami-nyami FM SRH sessions were done during the quarter covering issues to do with gender based violence, rights and responsibilities, cervical cancer screening, relationships, disclosure on HIV status and referral pathways for various services were offered during the programme. 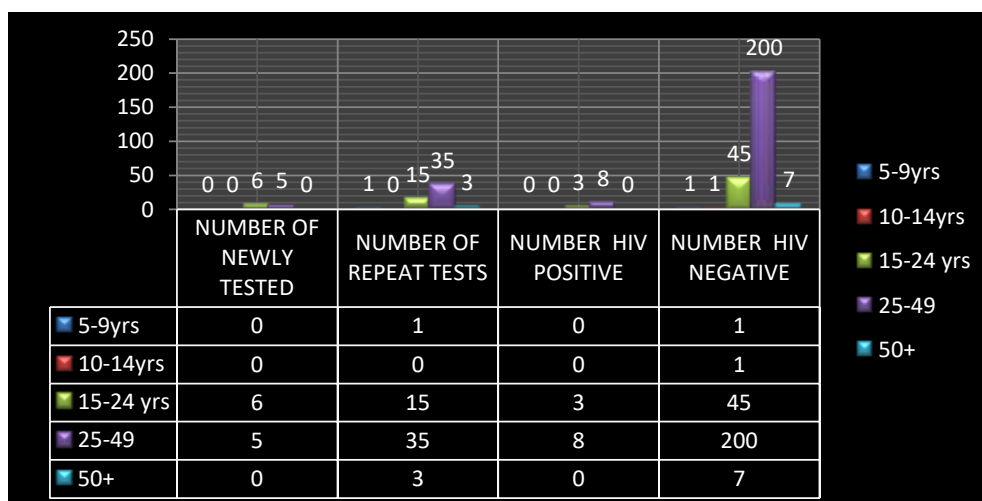
OUTREACHES

Integrated outreaches for the quarter were done in Makande which covered 4 points namely Chitete, Kudzanayi, Hurenje and Nyajena, Fothergill and Nyaodza Fishing Camps including Charara estates, NAU and Quarry mining area. Demand for services saw VIAC outreaches at Nyamhunga clinic and Musamba Clinic being provided. This was done in partnership with ministry of health and child care. The aim was to contribute towards the 90 90 90 targets and at the same time providing sexual reproductive health services to these people in hard to reach areas. The team offered the following services i.e. immunizations, family planning, HIV counseling and testing services, growth monitoring, dispensing ART, and treatment of minor ailments and VIAC. Health education was given where they were taught on condom use. A total of 103 (44M 59F) managed to access viral load services during the outreach period whilst 43 (19M 24F) accessed CD4 cell count services. See photos of served points below

LIVELIHOODS PROJECTS

The organization operates in four livelihoods gardens namely Padare, ZIHOPFE and Charara and primary school in a bid to improve nutritional support and household income through availability of

fresh vegetables for consumption they are fully utilizing their space to draw maximum benefits from their garden. Padare garden received equipment for the garden



SEWING PROJECT

The organisation's sewing project continues with out of school adolescents engaged in the making of reusable sanitary pads. The organisation chipped in with marketing strategies in schools to ensure viability of the project. Adolescents have applauded the skills they are getting with some testifying they can now use a sewing machine well and are confident to succeed. The organisation also conducted an end of project review meeting at Tony Waite offices where stakeholders were informed of project progress success and challenges. They were notified that it was the grant that had come to an end but since the project was community driven it was going to continue and the machines acquired will continue to be used for production. Project beneficiaries shared their success and they benefitted through ISAL, sanitary wear making as well as business management training. PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT

Youth clubs and support groups have continued to meet in their respective wards. During the quarter the organisation managed to reach a total of 264 (109M 155F) in youth clubs and support groups. They continue getting information on SRHR, Gender Based Violence, hygiene, child abuse, rights and responsibilities. They continue requesting for balls so as to engage in sporting activities during their

club meetings. These meetings are being hailed and sustained purely through community involvement as they are operating at no cost. A total of 145 (61M 84F) received counseling from the volunteers during the quarter. The organisation also managed to conduct a meeting with 25 adolescents at Salvation Army church in ward 1 where information was given on abuse and gender based violence. The topics covered included forms of abuse and GBV, prevention as well as referral pathways. A total of 18(8M 10F) children benefitted from the Christmas lunch served by Caribbea Bay Hotel as part of its giving back to the vulnerable in the community. The children were overjoyed at such an opportunity and applauded the gesture. See photos below



COMPREHENSIVE LEGAL AND SCHOLASTIC SUPPORT

The organization has continued to support Orphans and Vulnerable Children in the community scholastically. The organization paid fees and upkeep for a total of 64 of which 2 male students receiving support for tertiary education at Midlands State University and Great Zimbabwe University as well as 1 female student at Bulawayo Polytechnic. The organisation also managed to pay school fees for 43 secondary students and 18 primary school students.

KAPENTA FISHING AND MARKETING EXPANSION PROJECT

The organization has also continued to support vulnerable women and youths economically through income generating project of Kapenta. A total of 35 (18M 17F) were employed during the quarter and the majority of women highlighted that the project is helping them to provide food for their families, to pay for school fees and rentals. Some of these women are survivors of gender based violence.
