SEPTEMBER 2017 MONTHLY REPORT

INTRODUCTION

Tony Waite has continued to scale up its operations from urban, peri-urban and hard to reach areas. The organization also continues to thrive offering a robust and holistic package of philanthropic assistance to children infected and affected by chronic illnesses orphans and the vulnerable, men and women, boys and girls in the community.

IDENTIFICATION OF NEEDY COMMUNITY MEMBERS

Trained volunteers continued to identify people in need of care. These people include women, men, boys, and girls seeking medical assistance, school fees, nutritional support and others having suffered Gender Based Violence.

2. TO IMPROVE HOUSEHOLD INCOME, FOOD SECURITY AND HEALTHY

NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT

The organization benefited donations from Schweppes Zimbabwe. They managed to donate 50 food packs humpers. A total of 130 (80M 50F) orphans and vulnerable children benefitted. The organization continued with its feeding programme and reached 341 orphans and vulnerable children in its feed programme. Within this total figure 211(105M 106F) were reached with fish heads and whilst 130(80M 50F) were reached with kapenta. The organisation also managed to reach 16 (6M 10F) elderly with kapenta for the month of September. See photos below



MEDICAL SUPPORT

A total of 3 102 (980M 2122F) were reached with SRHR information which led to a total of 226 (70M 156F) getting tested for HIV and knowing their statuses. The figure comprises those reached through the Women and child health project, family clubs, and those reached in youth clubs. Secondary caregivers continue to spread the gospel through ward meetings and door to door sessions, they conducted ward meetings reaching to 206 (37M 169F) and a total of 628 (198M 430F) individuals and 469 couples reached through door to door counselling sessions. They reached 498 (122M 376F) with GBV information focusing on prevention of GBV and referral pathways. Volunteers have managed to offer assistance to 66 (12M 54F) individuals on GBV and these referrals were 8 (3M 5F) were referred to VFU for assistance and 10 (2M 8F) to Social Services department for further assistance as well. Tony Waite volunteers have also managed to give TB adherence support to 15 (6M 9F) individuals and 3 (1M 2F) were reported to have completed their treatment. The PMTCT mothers' meetings are ongoing at Nyamhunga Clinic with the PMTCT champion spearheading the

discussions and disseminating information whilst encouraging disclosure. She talked about the community supporting each other in terms of PMTCT and giving support to women living with HIV so as to fight stigma and discrimination. A total of 56 (10 M 46F) mothers were reached during PMTCT meetings at Nyamhunga clinic.

The organization continues working hand in glove with other organizations and this has ensured cooperation which has assisted the disadvantaged and the underprivileged. Volunteers continue to conduct home visits to Community Home Based Care clients and support visits.

Mentoring visit to the volunteers was done during the month of September during this meeting volunteers were encouraged to work hard and do their duties effectively, and to open up if one is no longer interested to be part of volunteers team so that the organization will know how to strategies and plan for the future. Volunteers were urged to work hard in glove with the community and were encouraged to submit their reports in time. Volunteers received promotional materials on girl plan in form of shirts. OUTREACHES Tony Waite Organization in partnership with the Ministry of health and child care conducted integrated outreaches for hard to reach areas namely Nyaodza, ndomo, Quarry, NAU and Charara. The prices for boarding water vessels are high and they do not provide a reliable and consistent service hence people are alienated from the district health center. The main purpose is to provide essential health services inclusive of antenatal care, HIV testing services, ART resupply, Child immunization and growth monitoring, family planning services as well as treatment of general ailments as we contribute towards the 90% 90% 90% targets by 2020.

LIVELIHOODS PROJECTS The organization operates in four livelihoods gardens namely Padare, ZIHOPFE, Charara and primary school in a bid to improve nutritional support and household income through availability of fresh vegetables for consumption they are fully utilizing their space to draw maximum benefits from their garden. Charara garden are harvesting king onions' and they are selling them at \$1 for four .The garden members at Padare have planted covo vegetables, carrots, tsunga and tomatoes and some onions and the crops are ripe and some of the vegetable they already started selling. Schweppes donated US\$1 000.00 for one of our community gardens in Padare garden Mahombekombe See photos charara garden of people living with HIV charara primary school garden below



We had a visit from Netherlands Embassy (Mrs Gaudencia Muzambi) to support the poverty alleviation and women empowerment project which involved trainings in business management, internal savings and lending. PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT Youth clubs and support groups are continuing to meet once per month holding their meetings at Nyamhunga and Mahombekombe. A total of 246 (M95 F151) been

reached during the month of September. They continue getting information on SRHR, Gender Based Violence, hygiene, child abuse, rights, and responsibilities. The youth club meetings are a good tool in supporting youths facing different challenges. They provide a support system for adolescents living with chronic illnesses and those faced with idleness whilst they are also a hub for information dissemination.

FAMILYCLUBMEETINGS

Organization managed to conduct family clubs in the month of September reaching a total of 20 females. These are instrumental in disseminating and sharing parental skills, giving information on SRHR, Gender Based Violence whilst promoting adherence for people living with HIV .There is also the opportunity to share skills and conduct internal savings and lending as a way of uplifting lives of the vulnerable in the community. The meetings are conducted in the wards where the women are participating in their various economic strengthening activities.

Support is needed in terms of refreshments and materials to use in their detergent making project whilst they continue sighting the positive aspect that they are benefitting in terms of peer support. The club meetings deserve to be scaled up as they are a tool to improve adherence in children and their primary caregivers as parents get support from their peers

KAPENTA PROJECT

The organization has also continued to support vulnerable women and youths economically through income generating project of Kapenta. Some of these people are survivors of gender based violence, are caring for children with disabilities and some of the women are also living with disabilities. We had a total of 35 staff members for the month of September with a breakdown as follows: Admin and programs 5 (3M 2F), fishermen 8 M, merchandisers 10 (5M 5F), packers 11 (10F 1M) and 1 rack Attendant. See photos below a fisherman wins a shirt after beating the target of 2 500 tons of wet kapenta and packers busy with packaging.



Fishermen and packers had a refresher course on rig operations and production. The training was
